As for calling in work orders, we lose points because of the leaking faucet you didn't report. We lose points because of the broken back door you didn't report. Please, call in the work orders. When you don't, we all lose. The same is true for blocked windows. Your safety is in jeopardy if you're unable to escape out an upstairs window because of a fire. To put it bluntly, we get dinged for every upstairs window you block with a TV, a bunkbed, a bureau. Arrange items so windows are accessible.

OK, enough on that topic.

Immediately after the annual inspection, the Housing Authority underwent its annual audit. The firm that conducts the audit was here for two days. During that time, the auditors went through everything to do with the Housing Authority's finances. They held a magnifying glass up to all the dollars and cents. I'm pleased to say that all went well. Phew!

Bed Bug Information Center

Where should you look?

- Mattress (piping, sides, underside)
- Box spring (remove ticking)
- Bed frame
- Linens
- Furniture seams, pleats, piping, joints
- Corners and drawers of desks, dressers, etc.
- Door, window, and baseboard trim
- Items on the floor

What should you look for?

- All life stages: eggs, nymphs, adults
- Skin casts
- Blood spots

How do you avoid them?

Carefully inspect all used furniture, linens, and clothing before bringing them into your home.


- Wash and dry clothes on hottest setting items can stand. Transport clothes in plastic bags. Do not put clean clothes in bags used to transport dirty clothes. Throw those away!
- Vacuum frequently.
- Remove clutter.

If possible, use a high powered flashlight when looking around your unit. If you find a bed bug, notify staff immediately. Staff and you will work together to prepare for any needed treatment. Don't delay. It's much easier to treat one or two than it is twenty or thirty. Again, successful eradication requires resident involvement and cooperation.

The sooner we know, the lower the cost to you.
